THE TAO OF VOICE



Fresh from having helped to save a forty year old dental program at Queen's Hospital, Vicky Cayetano and Washington Place (and former Iolani Palace) director Jim Bartels held a press conference on Friday morning and proposed turning Washington Place into a museum and building a new Governor's Mansion next door. 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FREE EYE EXAMS FOR MEDICARE BENEFICIARIES

Many diabetes sufferers, whether diagnosed or not, are unaware that they are at risk for eye problems, if not checked regularly by an eye care specialist. Thanks to the nationwide Diabetes Healthcare initiative, free eye exams are available for Medicare beneficiaries with diabetes who are 65 years of age and older, and haven't received an eye exam in the last three years.

If you (or perhaps one of your parents) meet those conditions, contact the EyeCare America National Eye Care Project at 1-800-222-3937 to receive a free eye exam from an ophthalmologist and up to a year of follow-up care for any condition diagnosed by the initial exam. Qualifying Medicare beneficiaries may also receive an eye exam by calling the American Optometric Association's diabetes hotline at 1-800-262-3947 for a referral to an optometrist for an exam and necessary follow-up care.

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
