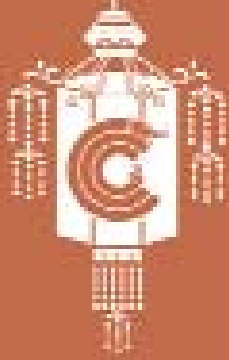

p.m. and returns at 5:30 p.m., and should not be confused with public tours to the Arizona Memorial.

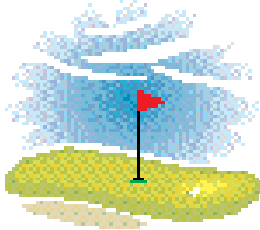

On the recent Narcissus Goodwill Tour to China in June and July, the Narcissus Queen and Court were truly ambassadors of the Chinese people of Hawaii as well as the State of Hawaii. A highlight of the 19-day trip was the formal reception for the Queen and Court, and later a dinner at the Great Hall of the People in Beijing for all tour members. The Chamber meeting with Mr. Bu He, Vice Chairman of the National People's Congress (NPC) did much to

maintain stronger ties between the Chamber and the Chinese government.

As usual, our Queen and Court performed the Hawaiian hula at the various reception dinner, but this time, the Queen and Court danced a hula to a popular Chinese song, which impressed the Chinese guests no end. Before the trip, we had the popular Chinese song translated and then choreographed to express, through the hula movements, the story of the Chinese song.

In the end, the tour brought much goodwill between the Chamber and the various Chinese government entities who met us.

During the past month, visits to Hawaii by Chinese officials and delegations (as discussed elsewhere in The Lantern) meant a busy month for the Chamber.

In the spirit of working together with

other organizations, the book drive with the Hong Kong Business Association is still under way. Also, a joint sponsorship with DBEDT, the East-West Center, and the Hong Kong Business Association of a luncheon on July 22, for Mr. Wan Jifei, Vice Chairman of the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade (CCPIT) brings to our members a chance to find out how "Hawaii Firms Can Benefit" from China's entry into the World Trade Organization (WTO).

Finally, our members should be getting a chance to have their business listing on the Chamber's Internet Website, which is being expanded in our efforts for greater communications among members.

PALOLO CHINESE HOME FUNDRAISING

When the Palolo Chinese Homes was founded in 1917, it was the first Asian care home in the U.S. The Home came about because of the vision and compassion that Hawaii's Chinese community leaders had to take care of their homeless elderly. The Home currently has sixty-eight dormitory-style beds and is planning to expand the facility to have eighty-eight apartments as well as to provide outreach service to their elderly in the greater community who may be in need of meals and other personal services, but do not reside in the Home.

The program, which should be completed in 2005, is expected to cost \$18 million. Chinese societies and organizations are being approached to contribute \$500,000.00 of these funds as our donations will demonstrate to the foundations and other major donors that the Chinese community is solidly behind this project. Members of the Chinese Chamber are encouraged to support this program. All pledges will be payable over a three-year period and are fully tax-deductible as the Palolo Chinese Home is an IRS 501(c)3 not-for-profit organization.

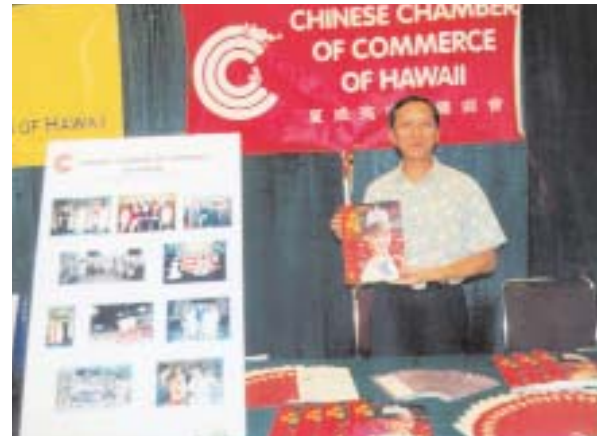

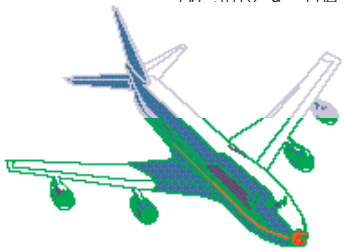

HVCB-HAINAN AIRLINE GROUP INITIATIVE

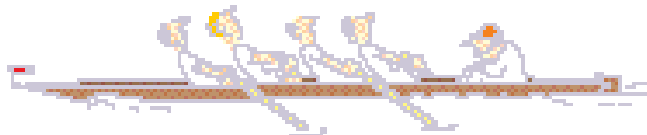


On July 9, the Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau (HVCB) and Hainan Airline Group signed a memorandum of cooperation to increase opportunities for Chinese tourists to visit Hawaii. The HVCB and Hainan Airline Group will work cooperatively to promote and facilitate tourism from China to Hawaii. In addition to general tourism, there will be targeted approaches for eco-tourism, sports tourism, programs built around Dr. Sun Yat-sen, and short-term training.

If current U.S. visa restrictions can be relaxed, Chinese visitors to Hawaii could increase to several hundred thousand annually. The China National Tourism Administration says that 10.5 million Chinese traveled abroad in 2000, a 13% increase over 1999, and according to the World Tourist Organization, within two decades, 100 million Chinese will travel abroad annually.

Hainan Airlines was founded ten years ago and has grown into China's fourth largest airline. It is a publicly listed company traded on the Shanghai Stock Exchange. Interestingly, its largest shareholder is the Soros Foundation, part of financier George Soros' group.

Dragon Boat Races



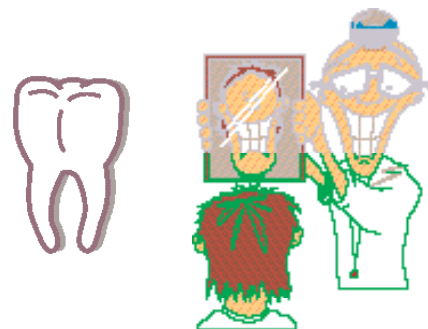
The 7th annual AT&T Dragon Boat Festival will be held on Saturday, August 3, and Sunday, August 4, at the usual Ala Moana Park venue. Following the annual blessing of the dragon boats in late June, rowing practice began. The practice on Saturday, July 13, has come and gone, and a group of young and old paddlers showed up. There will be more practices on Saturday, July 27, starting at 10:00 a.m., on Monday, July 29, starting at 5:30, and on Tuesday, July 30, again starting at 5:30 p.m. Please note that the practices are in the waters fronting the Hilton Hawaiian Village while the races are at Ala Moana Park. Anyone interested in paddling in the Chamber boat on August 3 - the Cup Race Division heats - should show up for practices. Novice and experienced paddlers alike are welcome. Chamber dragon boat race T-shirts will be given to each paddler, courtesy of a donation by Ideal Realty.

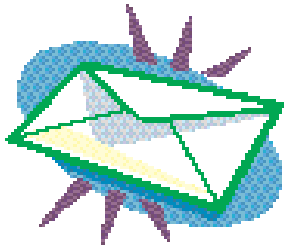
Plans are being made for a picnic lunch on race day. CHAMBER DENTAL DISCOUNT PLAN

The Hawaii Family Dental Centers' Ho'ala Dental Program is available for the Chamber or its members. The Ho'ala Dental Program was created by Hawaii Family Dental Centers (HFDC), a locally owned and operated company that has been providing quality dental care for over sixteen years. HFDC has grown to eleven Centers state-wide and has over 35 dentists of all specialties. On Oahu, HFDC has Centers located in Aiea Heights, Mililani, Westridge, Windward Mall, and Waterfront Plaza.

Ho'ala was designed especially for individuals and groups desiring a dental program that is affordable and easy to use. Ho'ala is a membership program that enables members to receive complete dental care at discounted rates, not an insurance program. There are no age restrictions, benefit maximums, waiting periods or exclusions. The monthly membership fees are \$14.00 per month for individuals, \$28.00 per month for two-parties, and \$49.00 per month for families. State Representative Nestor Garcia recently filed to run for a City Council seat in District 9, encompassing Wai-pahu, Mililani, and Makakilo. With many residents in the area commuting to work downtown, Nestor has to get up really, really early to wave and hold signs.

The July 23 deadline for candidates to file to run for office in elections this fall has come and gone. It appears that State Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland is unopposed for her senate seat. Her "Capitol Connection" newsletter has an

update on the 2002 legislature, listing a number of bills that she voted in favor of. With the bill numbers given in the newsletter, it was possible to find the act numbers for two bills on prescription drugs (Acts 74 and 75).

Other Chamber members who are running for office include: Lei Ahu Isa who recently switched parties and will be running for the 12th Senatorial district (Waikiki, Ala Moana, and Downtown) seat as a Republican; Corinne Ching, who is running for the 27th house district (Liliha, Punui) seat; Rod Tam, who has left the senate and is running for the 6th Council district (Kalihi Valley, Nuuanu, Kakaako) seat; and Jerry Chang who is running for reelection in the 2nd House district (Piiponua, Kaumana) on the Big Island.

Longtime Chamber director Vernon Jim has been selected as the United Chinese Society Model Chinese Father of the Year 2002. On August 11, Dr. Jim (as well as the Model Chinese Mother) will be honored at a dinner at the China Plaza Restaurant at the Chinese Cultural Plaza starting at 5:30 p.m.

Elvira Lo attended the 3rd Sino-U.S. Mayors Conference dinner on July 25 at

the Hilton Hawaiian Village. About 100 people attended, including the vice mayors of seven different cities in China as well as Chinese business representatives and nineteen delegations. There was a lion dance, a Hawaiian dance group provided entertainment, an exchange of gifts, a group photo, and a chance to network.
