A year of planning and hard work finally came to fruition as the Chamber unveiled to an eager public the much-awaited Narcissus Classic on March 10 at the Hawaii Theatre. Led by Chair **Linda Auyoung Louie**, **Wanda Tse**, and **Michele Choy**, the Narcissus Classic committee promised an elegant night of music and delivered a show that the public is still talking about.

Virtuosos **Yun Deng**, **Cinderella Liao**, **Kewei Wang**, and **Xu Le** wowed the audience by performing a demanding repertoire of music that included opera, Broadway, Chinese folk songs, and Hawaiian numbers. Accompanied by Hawaii's premier music producer, **Beebe Freitas**, these four international superstars graced the stage of the Hawaii Theatre and delighted their fans by signing autographs after the concert. **Ori Ann Li**, the evening's mistress of ceremonies, brilliantly provided a short synopsis in English and Chinese of each song.

In my opening remarks, I pointed out several interesting items that were not listed in the program. First, these stars were Chinese, but their performances were sung in eight different languages. Second, this was the first time that they were performing together, despite having had less than a week for rehearsals. Third, the effort to coordinate their busy schedule and bring them to Hawaii was nothing less than a CIA-type operation. Cinderella trains and lives in Europe, Yun Deng is on contract with New York's Metropolitan Opera, Kewei lives and teaches in Taiwan, and Xu Le is a recording artist in China. Finally, I mentioned to the audience that my voice and the emcee's were the only two amplified voices. The performers

were all trained to perform "unplugged."

In addition, we were very fortunate to have **Harry Winston** provide the beautiful jewelry that was worn by our star sopranos, Yun and Cindy. I also noted that security was increased for the evening because the jewelry had a retail value of over one million dollars.

Perhaps the real "star" of the concert was the Chinese community. I felt a tremendous amount of pride in seeing Chinese artists performing at the highest level. The Chamber should also be proud in knowing that this event is a bold and creative move that no other Chinese organization would consider or attempt. The event dramatically demonstrates our ability to excel in many different disciplines. Nevertheless, people have told me that this is just the tip of a "mountain of Chinese talent." With that in mind, I am looking forward to seeing Narcissus Classic II. Bravo to all who worked on this year's event.

The election of new officers on March 16 reminds me that my term in office ends soon. Plans have already started for our installation luncheon at the end of May. In keeping with our effort to make the event "member-friendly," the Executive Committee has decided on a new look. This year, we are committed to encouraging and increasing membership attendance. Accordingly, we plan to showcase our membership with display tables and exhibits. While past installations have become somewhat ostentatious, we will not ignore our bonds with the various societies, and all Chinese organizations will continue to be on our honored guest list. I have requested that the Chamber invite the U.S. Small Business Director as our keynote speaker in light of our emphasis on commerce.

While a recent Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Plan meeting that I attended offered various definitions of sustainability, it appears that we also need to pay more attention to the future. For the Chamber, this is certainly true. As such, on April 21, the Executive Committee plans to set aside some time to discuss various long-term issues at an Executive Retreat. The officers and directors are prepared to discuss various core issues, such as our mission and goals, by-law changes, revenue enhancing strategies, and inter-

organizational and society relationships.

Finally, at the Lung Kong Kung Shaw installation, I marveled at the efforts of President **Mavis Chong**, daughter of Chamber director **Henry Chu**, in the recent renovation of their organization's headquarters. She told me that most of the money was borrowed, but the renovation will help to retain and attract the younger generation. In her installation speech, she said "It's an investment in the future." I believe that the Chamber needs to adopt the same attitude in finding a permanent office location.

## PASSPORT ALERT

Starting on January 23, 2007, Americans who have traveled overseas and are returning from Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Latin America by airplane have been required to produce a valid U.S. passport. One unintended consequence of that requirement has been a dramatic increase in the time needed to process applications for passports. Instead of the previous six weeks, "routine service" may take as many as ten weeks. For those considering going on the Narcissus Goodwill Tour with **Ed** and **Gayle Pei** and **Jessica Lau** and her court, the June 3 departure date is less than ten weeks away. And while a visa may not be necessary for entry into Hong Kong, it is necessary to get into China. That means additional time since the PRC consulate is in Los Angeles.

A passport application (Form DS 11) is available at numerous locations on Oahu and also can be downloaded from the Internet ([www.travel.state.gov/passport](http://www.travel.state.gov/passport)). In addition, one of the thirteen regional passport agencies is located in the Prince **Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole** Federal Building on Ala Moana Boulevard, and is open Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Applicants for a new passport must pay a \$67.00 application fee and a \$30.00 execution fee. In addition, "expedited service" is available for an additional \$60.00, but the former processing time of two weeks may be four weeks or longer. In either case, remember that Mrs. Murphy's law – "if something can go wrong, it will" – can delay your paperwork. So a word to the wise: Do it now!

## COMPACFLT TALK


