NOTICE: *The Lantern* Goes Online!

Chinese New Year is Thursday, February 3 That will be the approximate start date for *The Lantern*, which will be available to Chamber members and others interested in the Chamber primarily online at the Chamber Web site (www.chinesechamber.com).

While this may represent a major change for some Chamber members (“But we’ve always done it this way...”), there are a number of benefits for the Chamber and its members. First, we are well into the 21st century and many of our members do much of their reading and research online rather than clutter their office or home with printed or “hard” copies of newspapers, magazines, and even newsletters. Second, in an online or “virtual” version, all of the *Lantern’s* photographs will be in color rather than only black and white in the hard copy. Third, the process of producing a hard copy that is mailed out to each of our members each month is expensive in terms of money and manpower. Postage costs alone (without considering paper and copying) amounts to about \$200.00 each month or \$2,400.00 a year. In addition, printing, folding, inserting one or more fliers, labeling, attaching stamps, and taking the bundled *Lanterns* to the post office takes a day or more of staff time. Finally, getting the *Lantern* online is environmentally friendly – no trees have to be cut down nor paper produced.

So starting with the February, 2011 issue of *The Lantern*, if you wish to continue to receive the hard copy via snail mail delivered by an agent of the U.S. government, you must call the Chamber right away and let Wen or Grace know. (This is known as “opting in”). If you do not so notify the Chamber, it will be presumed that you want the online version of *The Lantern*. The choice is simple: Do nothing and you can access *The Lantern* at the Chamber Web site OR call the Chamber and say you want to continue to get *The Lantern* through the U.S. mail.

Narcissus Pageant and Reception

On Saturday, January 8, the Narcissus Pageant will again be held at the Hawaii Theatre. There are 13 lovely contestants who have worked long and hard attending a variety of classes on Chinese culture, perfecting a talent number, practicing walking in a long *cheongsam* and high heels, doing research for the question they will be asked on-stage, and preparing for the judges’ interview. It will be an exciting and suspenseful evening. Due to time constraints, the Pageant will start promptly at 6:30 p.m. and end before 10:00 p.m., so if you plan to attend, please get there early. If you do, you’ll have a chance to meet members of the current Narcissus Court, buy a souvenir book (which covers the various Festival events as well as having some interesting articles), and greet old friends who you may meet only once a year at the Pageant. Tickets are \$34.00 and \$29.00, and good seats are still available.

In addition, following the Pageant, family and friends are asked to vacate the building, and to meet and greet their favorite contestant outside, in the park on the *makai* side of the Hawaii Theatre. For those who want to meet and greet the new Narcissus Queen and her court as well as the other contestants in a more leisurely and less crowded manner, you can do so at a post-Pageant reception at the Panda Express in Moanalua Shopping Center, 1090 Valkenburgh Street, starting at 11:00 p.m. Food and soft drinks will be provided by Panda Express. There is an “early bird” rate of \$5.00 for post-Pageant reception tickets, which will be \$10.00 at the door. If you plan to attend either event, please contact the Chamber right away at 533-3181.

Chinese New Year Celebration

On Friday, January 28, a pride of lions from six Chinese lion dance clubs will gather at the Chinese Chamber building, 8 South King Street, for the ceremonial *choy cheng* (*Cai qing* in Mandarin) or “picking the greens.” This also marks the start of the Chinatown Open House, in which the Narcissus Queen and her court, escorted by Chamber officers, will visit a variety of Chinatown shops and restaurants to wish them a happy and prosperous new year. There were quite a few Chamber events, making for a very busy month. On Wednesday, December 1, two donor plaques were unveiled at a lunchtime ceremony. On the plaques are listed the names of the donors to the Chamber Building Fund and their categories of donations. An informative presentation on World War II Medal of Honor recipient Captain **Francis Brown Wai** was held on Saturday, December 4. Instead of focusing solely on Francis, the presentation also included information about his three brothers (all of the brothers were star athletes in high school and college) and growing up in 1930s Honolulu as well as World War II. On Wednesday, December 8, the annual Chamber Christmas party was again held at the Hale Koa Hotel. There were a little over 100 people who gathered to enjoy the festive occasion with a fine meal, many door prizes, several challenging games, Christmas carols, a roving female singer, and even an appearance by Santa Claus.

Then on Wednesday, December 15, TECO Director General **Paul Chang** gave a talk on the recently signed Economic Cooperation Framework Agreement between China and Taiwan. It is the basis for further economic cooperation in the future. Finally, on Tuesday, December 28, the last general membership meeting of the year was held at the new Jade Dynasty restaurant in Ala Moana shopping center. This was without doubt a successful event. Shoehorned between Christmas and New Year's, there were nevertheless 108 people in attendance. They were so intent on networking that the lunch and panel – Shanghai American Chamber of Commerce President **Brenda Foster**, Prof. **Larry Foster**, Bank of Hawaii Vice President **Edward Hu**, and Prof. **Ronald Brown** – were delayed. Even then, only a couple of people left before the program, “Building Business Bridges to China,” ended. And following the program, those attending resumed their networking.
