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Narcissus Queen Contestants Update

The nine lovely young contestants are in the process of preparing for the Narcissus Pageant, which will be held on Friday, January 6, 2023 at New Hope Oahu. The ladies who bravely stepped forward to compete meet the following criteria: At least 25% Chinese ethnicity; single (never been married or given birth to a child); at least 19 years old and not over 27 years of age on Pageant night; and a resident of Hawaii for at least twelve (12) months prior to the Pageant. Their preparations include charm and make-up sessions as well as a variety of classes on different aspects of Chinese culture. They also are practicing for the talent phase of the Pageant. Following the Pageant, there will be a coronation event for the new Narcissus Queen and her court, a number of spring banquets with local Chinese societies and associations, and then a Narcissus Goodwill Tour next summer. (Unfortunately, with a "zero COVID" policy in effect, the 2023 Goodwill Tour will probably not go to China).

Medicare Open Enrollment

Like clockwork, each fall, "open enrollment" for Medicare arrives. This year, open enrollment for Medicare is from Saturday, <u>October</u> <u>15</u>, through Wednesday, <u>December 7</u>, for coverage that begins on January 1, 2023. During the open period, eligible individuals can enroll in Medicare while those already covered can change health care coverage for 2023 or just stay in their current plan. Medicare can be obtained through Original Medicare (Part A and Part B) or a Medicare Advantage plan (Part C). (Medicare Part A covers hospital care while Medicare Part B covers routine doctor's visits and other outpatient medical care). There is also prescription drug coverage through Medicare Part D as well as Medigap or Medicare supplemental insurance for out-of-pocket costs not otherwise covered.

Government-assisted Medicare is provided by doctors who accept Medicare payment and are accepting new patients while Medicare Advantage, offered by private insurance companies, has a "network" of providers and if a doctor you may want use is not in the network, you'll have to pay out-of-pocket. So it pays to do your research on the coverage, services, and benefits from different plans.

The good news is that this year, there will be a 3% reduction in the monthly Medicare Part B premium. (In addition, due to last year's "tranitory"inflation, there will be a 8.7% cost-of-living allowance (COLA) increase in your monthly Social Security check, starting in January, 2023). Also in the future, under the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), signed by President **Joe Biden** on August 16, the Department of Health and Human Services is authorized to negotiate prices on a small number of prescription drugs and the reductions will become effective in 2026. (In contrast, the federal government has had authority for years to negotiate prescription drug prices for Medicaid and Veterans Administration patients). In addition, the IRA places a \$35 per month cap on insulin copays for Medicare Part D beneficiaries, starting in 2023, and a \$2,000 annual cap on out-of-pocket copays on Part D prescription drugs, starting in 2025.

COVID-19 Update

The big news is that on August 1, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved the use of 'bivalent' vaccine booster shots produced by Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna. The bivalent booster shot consists of half of the original COVID-19 vaccine formulation developed to provide protection against the original strain, and half of a new formulation developed specifically to combat Omicron subvariants BA.4 and BA.5; the latter is now dominant in the U.S.

Then in mid-October, the FDA authorized the bivalent booster shots for use as a booster with younger patients: 5 through 11 years old with Pfizer/BioNTech and 6 through 11 years old with Moderna. (Previously, the boosters were approved for use with patients 12 or more years old). Either vaccine may be administered as a single-dose at least two months after completion of primary or monovalent booster vaccination.

The most recent news is that the Pfizer/BioNTech bivalent booster offers the strongest protection in people older than 55. One month after receiving a booster, those in this age group had four times more neutralizing antibodies against the Omicron BA.4 and BA.5 subvariants than others who received the original vaccine as a booster. Nevertheless, booster vaccination rates remain low, due to people who haven't heard about the new boosters (and their efficacy) or would rather take their chances with a severe case of the coronavirus or even death. Dr. Leana Wen wrote in the October 17 *Washington Post* that booster uptake could be increased by targeting those who need it the most. This means that it's especially appropriate for those 65 years or older who are at greater risk of being hospitalized or dying.





On September 24, the 2022 Narcissus Court was invited to participate in the Aloha Week Parade. Much thanks to Chuck Tsui of Aloha Chinese Concepts Assn. for inviting Narcissus Queen, Jenalyn Ng to ride on a rickshaw and the Court on their float that their Assn. worked hard to put together, "Aloha 'Āina. Love of the Land", this year's Aloha Week theme.
